Survivor of Postnatal Depression and Author Eyes without Sparkle: a Journey through Postnatal Illness





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"Childbirth is associated with a substantial psychiatric morbidity. It has long been known to increase the risk to women's mental health, particularly of developing a serious mental illness (postpartum psychosis and severe depressive illness). It is also known to be associated with an increased risk of recurrence particularly of serious affective disorder (bipolar illness and severe depressive illness). Women with chronic longstanding serious mental illnesses such as schizophrenia become pregnant and their condition may deteriorate or recur during pregnancy and the postpartum period...Perinatal mental health problems are therefore a major public health concern. They have wide ranging impacts on both maternal and infant mental and physical health and make a significant contribution to both maternal and infant morbidity and mortality."
